HEARING

There was no official hearing this evening.

GUEST SPEAKER

Mike Catalano, our representative from the Wayne County EMS Advisory board, reported to the board that Finger Lakes Ambulance is still struggling with staff numbers, but that Palmyra is still a priority. He also stated that the county appears to be moving towards "getting into the ambulance business", and will not only order new ambulances, but move away from using a fly car except for perhaps to be manned by the bosses.

COMMUNICATIONS RECEIVED

There were no additional communications received from the public for the board members prior to the meeting.

PUBLIC INPUT

Don Wilkins, from East Palmyra, wished to speak to the board regarding 2351 Lyon Rd. He first stated that he was appreciative of the boards effort to get it all cleaned up and that it did look much better. However, he was concerned about environmental testing that might need to now be done. He said that for the past decade things had been dumped on that property that should not have been, and that it all tips towards the drainage ditch. He voiced his concern for people with wells, and asked for perhaps semi-annual testing. Some discussion ensued, and it was decided that Mr. Wilkins would email his concerns to both the supervisor and town clerk, and then the supervisor would investigate the concerns and would revisit at the next meeting.

The following statement is now to be included on all public agendas:

**If you are attending a Town Board Meeting have not signed up for Public Participation Section of the Town Board Meeting pursuant to the rules which have been established (24 hrs prior to start of meeting), then you will not be able to express your opinion. REPORTS OF STANDING COMMITTEES

**Supervision---Animal Control, Historian, Justices, and Finance -
Kenneth Miller, Chairman**

1. East Palmyra Cemetery: Don Wilkins stated that the E. Palmyra Cemetery will probably run out of money in 3-4 yrs., and reminded the board that if that happened, the town would then need to take over all aspects of running the cemetery. This would include selling plots, digging graves, lawn care etc, and would cost the town a great deal of time and money. The board asked that Mr. Miller remind the book keeper at budget time next year to perhaps add financial assistance to the East Palmyra Cemetery to the budget.

2. Cold War Veteran's Exemption: Supervisor Miller explained that over the years, we have had a handful of Cold War Veterans request exemptions, and that a few of the towns in Wayne County do offer one, including Macedon and Farmington. Veteran Mike Jaromin asked to address the board and read the following statement:

Good evening ladies and gentlemen.

My name is Michael Jaromin and I want to thank you for letting me speak. I recently moved to Palmyra to be closer to my daughter and my two grandsons. I previously was living in Florida, but as a result of the pandemic and the changing landscape in the nation I felt it was important to be close to family.

I am here tonight to ask for your assistance with a special request to consider offering a veteran's property tax exemption. New York State offers three different property tax relief programs that are available to veterans and any county, city, town, school district or village can choose to offer one or more of these exemptions. Currently the town offers only 1 of these exemptions which provides relief to veterans who served during a period of war. The town could choose to honor the other 2 available exemptions, including the Cold War Veteran's exemption to provide relief to residents like myself.

I am a 100% service connected disabled veteran who has served our country from 1981 to 1988. My injuries received during that time have prevented me from future employment and I rely on my veterans and disability benefits as my only source of income. I believe that a veteran who has served their country for freedom in the Cold War is just as deserving of relief as those who served during a period of war. New York State believes that too, or else they wouldn't have this exemption as an option for municipalities.

The Cold War exemption would reduce the assessed value of my home by about 10 to 15%, with an additional reduction because I'm a disabled veteran. Neighboring towns, such as the town of Macedon, NY and Farmington, NY offer the Cold War exemption. Please consider offering this same relief to Palmyra residents such as myself. I'm confident that offering this relief would have minimal impact on the tax rates, but it would make an incredible impact for me and my family.

Thank you very much for your time this evening.

3. Town Policy for Sewer Water Exemption for A Private Pool Refill: We do not have a written policy on a liner replacement. Our "past practice has been to discount sewer bill for new installations only. The argument is that on a liner replacement the water is not going down the sewer line. It should include a receipt for a new liner and a water reading, before and after refill. Mr. Miller did not expect a decision this evening, but was looking for the board members to give it some thought and let him know what ideas they had. He would reach out to both Marty Aman from WCWSCA, and CEO Par Sheridan to try to come up with a plan for next month.

4. Introduce LOCAL LAW #2 – 2022 “Real Property Tax Levy Limit”:
Supervisor Miller introduced the following local law to the board, as written below:

LOCAL LAW #2 – 2022 “Real Property Tax Levy Limit”

Section 1. Legislative Intent

It is the intent of this Local Law to override the limit on the amount of real property taxes that may be levied by the Town of Palmyra pursuant to General Municipal Law §3-c, and to allow the Town of Palmyra to adopt a budget for the fiscal year 2023 that requires a real property tax levy in excess of the "tax levy limit" as defined by General Municipal Law §3-c.

Section 2. Authority

This Local Law is adopted pursuant to subdivision 5 of General Municipal Law §3-c, which expressly authorizes the town board to override the tax levy limit by the adoption of a local law approved by the vote of sixty percent (60%) of the town board.

Section 3. Tax Levy Limit Override

The Town Board of the Town of Palmyra, County of Wayne, is hereby authorized to adopt a budget for the fiscal year 2023 that requires a real property levy in excess of the amount otherwise proscribed in General Municipal Law, §3-c.

Section 4. Severability

If any clause, sentence, paragraph, subdivision, or part of this Local Law or the application thereof to any person firm or corporation, or circumstance, shall be adjusted by any court of competent jurisdiction to be invalid or unconstitutional, such order or judgment shall not affect, impair or invalidate the remainder thereof, but shall be confined in its operation to the clause, sentence, paragraph, subdivision, or part of this Local Law or in its application to the person, individual, firm or corporation or circumstance, directly involved in the controversy in which such judgment or order shall be rendered.

Section 5. Effective Date.

This Local Law shall take effect immediately upon filing with the Secretary of State.

1. Highway Department report for October:

**HIGHWAY SUPERINTENDENT REPORT

Since the 9/22/22 Town Board meeting we have completed the following work:

- Tree Cleanup – Harris Road, Walker Road,
- Shoulder Work – Cambier, Dey, Fagner, Omeal, Hogback, Garnsey Roads
- Sign Work – Fagner, P.Gibson Rd, Division

- **Tree & Brush Work** – Summer roadwork is complete. Over the next several months we intend to continue brush mowing roadsides and performing tree work as time and weather permit throughout the Fall/Winter months. We continue to deal with dead ash trees along our roadsides

- **Roadside Mowing** - Our roadside mowing program will be coming to an end soon. Chris Bratt continues to do an excellent job and we intend to have him back for another season next Spring.

- **Winter Prep** – In the past couple weeks, we have started installation of plows/wings and salters on various trucks. We currently have 3 Town and 2 Village trucks completely outfitted. We will continue to prep more trucks in the coming weeks. Our sand and salt barns are fully stocked.

- **Fall Highway Conference** – On Sept 20-23, I attended our 93rd Annual Fall Highway Conference and Education Symposium held at Holiday Valley Conference Center. This year, the State Association presented an Honorary Life Member Award to retired Highway Supt Bill Slocum from the T/Ontario for his work. Seven retired WC Hwy Supts returned to honor Bill at the ceremony, including our retired highway superintendent, Nelson Cook.

- **Canaltown Days Assistance** – After a 2-year hiatus due to Covid, we helped with the setup and teardown of the 52nd Canaltown Days on Sept 24th-25th. Next year Canaltown Days is Sept 16th-17th.

- **Personnel** – Scott Moulton returned to work on 10/11, but Bill Austin went out on 10/12. Longtime Village Foreman Jim Eckert retired with just over 32 years of service from the Village Highway last month. His last day was Sept 28th. Chad Shaffer was hired to replace the vacancy.

- **Striping** - WC Highway recently finished up striping our roads.
- **Boiler/Fan Project** – Thank you for the completion of these Projects this summer. We recently turned on the waste oil boiler and the heated floor has been welcome improvement! I have already submitted this Project for CHIPs funding reimbursement, which we will get in mid-December.
- **Salt Barn Project** – As requested during the recent budget workshops, I have started some initial discussions and inquiries about a new salt storage facility. I also attended a salt de-icing seminar this past Tuesday at the T/Macedon Hwy and had another chance to see their salt storage operation. Attached is a picture from this event.

Mr. Boesel took a moment to thank the E Palmyra Fire Department for helping in clearing fallen trees when they see them!

2. Amended Agreement: The Amended Intermunicipal Agreement for Administration, Maintenance, and Repair of Village Highway System between Village and Town is on the agenda for approval this evening. This will extend the existing agreement for one more year.

1. Assessor's Office Report for October:

**REPORT TO THE TOWN BOARD
FROM THE ASSESSOR'S OFFICE
OCTOBER 25, 2022**

We sent out a few first year Enhanced (senior) STAR and IVP applications in September. We sent them to those that requested them before the state updated the forms with the newest information in August. Anyone that is 65 by the end of 2022 and currently has basic STAR and whose income is under \$93,200 will need to sign up for the enhance STAR by March 1st 2023. Anyone that needs these forms can contact the office and we will be happy to mail them out or they can go out to the Town's web site and there is a link for STAR information for all home owners including applications for those that qualify for the exemption and those that need to sign up for the STAR check. As always, **ALL** exemption applications are due by March 1st. As we do every year, we have signs outside the Town Clerk's office and in the entryway with information about who to contact about the Enhanced STAR. Pal-Mac School covers several towns so we provide the contact information for the other towns.

I have had to call the STAR hotline for a tax payer as they were reduced from the enhanced STAR to the basic. It should not have been reduced but the state did not have the income and the state letter was not received by the tax payer. This is a process to get the information that is needed to help the tax payer, I was on the phone with the State for about a half an hour. Unfortunately, the tax payer will need to pay the current bill and then get reimbursed from the State sometime in the next few months.

We have had an influx of walk-ins and phone calls over the last two months. Quite a few have been for the tax collector (to pay school taxes) and have been directed to the Town clerk's office. Some do want an Assessor's office but

Unfortunately, they need a different town – Pal-Mac covers about 5 towns. If it is something as simple as a form, we do provide that for them, however we still let them know to contact their town's assessor for what is required or for any other specific questions about their exemptions and/or assessments.

*****Also, we will need two (2) new members for the Board of Assessment Review. Nelson Claeysen has retired after many years as a member of the Board of Assessment Review. We have also been short the additional member for a couple of years. It is not easy to find someone to serve on this board, so it is going to take time to find someone who is willing to do the job.*****

2. CEO Report for October: Code Enforcement Officer Pat Sheridan submitted a report to the Board Members that includes a list of building permits and certificates of compliance for September 20th, 2022 thru October 25th, 2022.

CEO Pat Sheridan gave a brief report of the court ordered clean up that was completed on Lyon Rd. He stated that there had been a lawsuit against this property owner for many years, and that Judge Healy ordered that if he did not clean it up, the town would have to. K & D Disposal went in and removed all on the property that was in violation. The cost of this will be levied into the taxes, and the county will reimburse the town for all expenses. Mr. Sheridan thanked the board for their support thru this process.

3. Minutes from Zoning Board Meeting for October: There was no Zoning Board Meeting held in October.

4. Minutes from Planning Board Meeting for October: There was no Planning Board Meeting held in October.
